PRINCIPAL'S DESK



YEAR 12 GRADUATION

On Wednesday 30 October, I had the pleasure of attending our Year 12 Graduation Ceremony at the Norwood Town Hall. During the ceremony, a number of students received academic and leadership awards and all graduates received their graduation certificate. I would like to congratulate Ted Schmaal on his announcement as the College's Dux for 2019.



A highlight for me was seeing the strong and supportive relationships shared between our graduates and with their home group teachers; these connections and the sense of community were particularly pleasing to see. Our Year 11 students efficiently managed the event and the outstanding musical and dance performances by other students were very entertaining. On behalf of the students and parents, I would like to thank our Senior School Team, Mr Glasson, Ms Tomazos and Ms Savage, for their organisation of the evening.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

It is very important that the College develop relations with its wider community for the benefit of our school; once developed, these relationships will evolve and opportunities for our students will become evident.

Later this month I will be attending the **Ethnic Schools Association of SA 2019** Celebration Dinner; the invitation acknowledges the value the association places on our relationships with *Adelaide Tamil Language School*, the *Jivan Shilp School* and the *Adelaide Marathi Vidyalaya*, which use our facilities on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays. Cricket is played on our main oval on Saturdays and Sundays. The two clubs involved, **East Torrens** and **Pink Panthers Cricket Clubs**, maintain our oval and turf wicket.

I have agreed to a request from the **Marche Club** to use our R-6 Oval on Sunday 1 December 2019 for their annual Christmas Picnic. I had the pleasure of meeting Rob Cuifoli, immediate Past-President and the current President, Athos Vagnarelli, both of whom were excited about re-connecting with the College. I affirmed our desire to build further links with the Marche Club, and we will be discussing opportunities as they arise.

I'm finalising a Memorandum of Understanding with the **Adelaide East Education Centre (AEEC)** to establish an annexe here at the College next year. The annexe will see a small number of students and staff from AEEC use one of our classrooms, and subject to agreement, attend some mainstream classes. This annex agreement will be reviewed annually.

I have attended meetings and had discussions with representatives of local **Rotary** and **Lions Clubs**, to explore opportunities for our students to be involved in community-based initiatives, particularly those that enable our students to undertake learning, in the service of others.

2021 ITALIAN STUDY TOUR

I am pleased to announce that the College has been successful in an application to support a study tour to Italy by our Year 9 students in 2021. The substantial grant we have received will enable us to support our students to complete the tour and enhance their studies of Italian language and culture. SUPERHEROES – Dance with the Adelaide East students

For six weeks in Term 3, Ms McCarthur's Year 10 Dance class took part in a dance program with several students from our neighbouring school, Adelaide East Education Centre. Every Tuesday the Adelaide East students and the Year 10 class worked to create a dance routine the students could connect with. A first brainstorming, getting-to-know-you session formed the idea of our dance work, *Superheroes*. *Superheroes* was a comedic dance inspired by a Mark Ronson *Uptown Funk* parody, *Ultron-Funk*, which encouraged students to embody our favourite on-screen heroes. The piece was originally planned to be performed in Term 3's Dance Night *Wanderlust*. Creating *Superheroes* was a major eye

opener for me on how dance can be a bridge to overcome communication barriers, especially for students with a disability. In the beginning there was an uncertainty about whether or not we would be able to connect with the students we were working with but I found that, even after the first class, many of the students became more confident in taking part, bringing forward their own ideas, exercise requests and even warm up music. For my class, the lessons spent with the Adelaide East students fleshed out our abilities to be leaders and take responsibility in unfamiliar situations. *Superheroes* gave us the opportunity to develop our skills in communication, collaboration and creativity, encouraged us to express ourselves and to help others unleash their own creativity.



For me, *Superheroes* was an opportunity to involve others in what I love and what I'm passionate about. Although in the end we were unable to perform together, it was rewarding to see the students I had worked so close with finally see the piece they had worked so hard to create. I wholeheartedly believe that dancing with the Adelaide East students taught not only me but all of my classmates more about ourselves, not only as leaders and creators, but how we're able to help people break out of their shells and express themselves through dance. BRIDGE PROGRAM

AUSTRALIA-FIJI BRIDGE PROGRAM

In June, Charles Campbell College hosted Avinesh Nand, a teacher from Namosau Methodist School in Ba, north-west Fiji, as part of the BRIDGE (Building Relationships through Intercultural Dialogue and Growing Engagement) Program.

This program, sponsored by DFAT and coordinated by the Asia Education Foundation, aims to develop international connections with Pacific and Asian countries.

In September, I was fortunate to spend a week and a half in Fiji. I stayed with a Fijian family in Ba and spent time with the students at Namosau Methodist School, teaching them about Australia while also learning about Fiji.

When I arrived, I was treated to a full traditional welcoming ceremony with the staff and parents, including a traditional dance from the students. I was also given a garland and *masi*.



I was able to be with all nineteen classes at the school, ranging from Kindergarten to Year 8. The Kindy kids learnt some Australian songs in English, and they taught me a song in Fijian. The Year 3 classes learnt about Aboriginal art, and compared it with Fijian *masi* art, before being able to create their own Aboriginal dot paintings.

Back at CCC, Ellen Shannon's Year 4 class asked some research questions about traditional foods in Fiji, using an app called *FlipGrid*. The Year 4 students at Namosau Methodist School were able to respond and answer these questions in video format. This is an ongoing project between the Year 4 classes.

Thanks to donations from St Peter's Woodlands Grammar School, I was able to give the school a large number of readers. These books were gratefully received by the school. Now there are books in a range of reading levels available for all of the classrooms.



An interesting part of Fijian classrooms is the minimal technology. There's almost nothing – one laptop to share in the whole school, one projector, and the only internet access is in the office. However, Primary teachers are not allowed to access their own personal technology, even for teaching purposes.

The Fijian Ministry of Education decreed this to lessen the use of social media during instructional times – but it also created a barrier when it came to implementing learning activities. To fix this issue, I made a six-hour drive to the Fijian Ministry of Education in Suva, to appeal to the Minister. As a result, a clause was put in place for schools in special programs, for the Head teacher to give permission for teachers to appropriately use technology in their classrooms.



Along with Avinesh, I was also able to meet with the Australian High Commission in Fiji, to discuss the positive impact that the BRIDGE Asia-Pacific program has had. In particular, we were able to discuss the work around inclusive education, which has been a new initiative the Fijian government has implemented in all schools.

I would like to thank the many people who contributed towards making this trip possible:

- The CCC community, for donating classroom resources
- St Peter's Woodlands Grammar School, for donating readers
- Ellen Shannon, Andrew Wise and Dion Karagiannis for trialling the *Flipgrid* app, which I used in my teaching in Fiji
- Antonetta Macri and Helen Douglas-Irving, for their ongoing support with Year 7/8 Shared Learning

Finally, a trip like this couldn't happen without the CCC team going extra lengths while I was away. A massive thank-you to all the CCC staff who stepped in during my absence, in the areas of Pathways, SACE and Senior School Leadership.


EIGHT FORMER CCC STUDENTS STAR AT THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FESTIVAL STATESMAN
