# PRINCIPAL'S DESK

I am pleased to announce that for 2023 our Head Prefects are Mia H and Hannah G, and that our Deputy Head Prefects are Shaniq W and Lucy M.



I would like to thank our 2022 Head Prefects, Kaiswi P and Jessie W, for their dedication and commitment to their roles and for their achievements in leaving a strong leadership base upon which we can build a more extensive program for the future. I wish them well for their further studies and the roles they will play in the community.

Student leadership, voice and agency are an important part of the curricular and co-curricular programs at Charles Campbell College. In recognition of the need to strengthen our commitment to reconciliation, from 2023 we will be appointing two new Prefects with a responsibility to give greater voice and agency to members of our indigenous community. In addition, we will also be appointing two Prefects whose responsibilities will focus on ensuring that all members of our students are welcomed and play an active role in college life.

# SPORTS NEWS

Term 3 was a very busy term for school sport! We took a boys and a girls team to the Year 7-8 5-a-side Soccer Carnival held at Gepps Cross in Week 7 of Term 3. Well done to our boys team who finished in 3rd place. Unfortunately, our girls team had only five players so had to compete without a substitute, making for a very tiring but fun-filled day.



Well done to our Weekly Mixed Volleyball and Basketball Teams who competed against other schools throughout the zone each Tuesday afternoon during Term 3. The Mixed Volleyball Team finished in 4th place, showing big improvements in their game play each week. The Mixed Basketball Team finished Minor Round Premiers, however lost their first final. The team redeemed themselves in the semi-final, beating Modbury 46-40, finishing in 3rd place overall.



Congratulations to our Year 7-8 Girls Volleyball Teams who finished in 1st and 2nd place in a one day carnival held at MARS Stadium in Week 9. Both teams ended up *facing off*

against each other for the trophy in the Grand Final. We had a boys team compete who tried hard all day, however were up against some very tough opposition.




# DANCE NEWS


# 502 RESEARCH PROJECT

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# THE MARINE BIOLUMINESCENCE PHENOMENON OF: NOCTILUCA SCINTILLANS


## WHAT IS BIOLUMINESCENCE?

Marine bioluminescence, is defined by the Encyclopaedia of Britannica as the "biochemical emission of light made by a living organism". To put in simpler terms, it is a heatless or "cold" light that is chemically made by marine animals. This light is made when Luciferin is exposed to oxidation, creating the visible neon colours. (Encyclopaedia of Britannica, 2018)

Blooms (rapid accumulation of algae population) of Noctiluca Scintillans are highly sensitive and react to mechanical stimulus when their cell wall is touched causing the reaction of a neon blue bioluminescence. (Good Living, 2021)

## NOCTILUCA SCINTILLANS

Marine bioluminescence isn't strictly confined to animals though, single celled organisms such as the Noctiluca Scintillans are known to produce bioluminescence. These microorganisms are a species of dinoflagellate, a type of phytoplankton algae bacteria. (National Geographic, 2022) They are positively buoyant due to having a high accumulation of ions in the cytoplasm and are less dense than sea water.

It is a balloon-like shaped cell with a short flagellum, colourless cytoplasm and a larger tentacle used to capture prey by using sense. (BioWeb, 2007)

## APPEARANCE OF NOCTILUCA SCINTILLANS

Noctiluca Scintillans have an average diameter of 0.5 mm, but can range from 0.2mm to 2 mm. (IMAS, 2013) consumes through the process of phagocytosis - the process of a living cell ingesting another cell or particle. (Encyclopaedia of Britannica, 2018)


## WHEN AND WHERE DO THEY OCCUR?

Noctiluca Scintillans are commonly found in coastal regions with either temperate, subtropical or tropical waters, but can also be found after heavy rainfall due to mechanical stimulus. (Encyclopaedia of Britannica, 2018) They are more likely to occur during warmer seasons as warmer water temperatures allow algae to grow thicker and faster.

## TOXICITY?



Although this species of dinoflagellate does not produce organic toxins, they are toxic to marine life and invertebrates and have been the cause of massive fish mortality rates in the past due to the high ammonia presence in the vacuole. (IMAS, 2013)



# EDUCATORS SA AWARD

Congratulations to Bobbie Taylor, Assistant Principal Student Wellbeing and Inclusion, who has been awarded the Educators SA inaugural award for *Outstanding Contribution to Learners' Wellbeing and Development* for 2022. The award comes with a \$500 cash prize which Bobbie has already donated back to her professional association.

This award is for an educator who has contributed significantly to learners' wellbeing and development either directly through their own practice or by influencing and supporting other educators to focus on wellbeing. Bobbie actively mentors teachers who have an interest in mental health, some of whom go on to be Student Wellbeing Leaders (SWL) in their own right. She is currently mentoring a first year SWL at Charles Campbell College and supervising a 3rd year psychology student over the remainder of 2022.

Bobbie has been instrumental in putting her professional association's (SAWLIS) annual conference together over recent years. She also coordinated multiple twilight sessions this year and oversaw the co-hosted parent/SAWLIS Childhood Anxiety session held at CCC in Term 3 with Kirrilie Smout, child psychologist.

Over the past 12 months, Bobbie has edited a number of SAWLIS newsletters for the association's members, administered the SAWLIS Facebook page, and communicates regularly with their membership base via email.

# WRITE A BOOK IN A DAY

2022 marks the third year I have participated in the *Write a Book in a Day* competition.
